Dialogues on Diversity swept through the Stark County, Ohio area in March 2016 and received rave revues! It was a pleasure to host the performance and to work with Ron Jones on a high school performance at our freshman academy which has an enrollment of 600 students, and also for an evening community performance at the Kent State University Stark Campus.

Overwhelmingly, our students enjoyed the performance. This was confirmed by their responses to a program exit ticket in which 80% of the students chose "Agree" on all four of the following factors:

- I thought the assembly was worthwhile.
- I learned something during the assembly.
- I believe we need to treat others with respect.
- I believe the that next year's freshman students will like this assembly.

The other 20% of students agreed with all of the above statements except one (responses varied as to which one). Additionally, students expressed how much they enjoyed the performance and how much they learned on an open-ended response sheet.

What I personally appreciated the most about working with Ron was his diligence in spending time to discuss what our program goals were before the performance, and his willingness to personally engage the community stakeholders and students in small group settings in addition to the performance. He participated in a small group community stakeholder dialogue as well as a post-performance dialogue session with a small group of students. The opportunity for small group debrief was appreciated by the participants and meaningful exchanges and new understandings took place. Additionally, his passion for enlightening and pricking the conscience of others regarding diversity, equity and inclusion shines through his provocative, witty and just plain entertaining writing, character and plot development, stage presence and execution.

Our school community and the community at large found the program to be engaging, informative, relevant, and a unique way to penetrate the critical, yet delicate, topic of equity, diversity and inclusion.

I highly recommend Dialogues on Diversity as an opportunity to increase diversity awareness, initiate courageous conversations, and to have a good time while doing it.
